Pupil Premium Grant Report

The Pupil Premium Grant is designed to ensure that funding to support disadvantaged children reaches the pupils who need it most.

The funding is given to schools with pupils from Reception to Year 11 who are:

- Eligible for free school meals (FSM),
- Looked after by the Local Authority – Children in Care.
- Have parents currently in the Armed Forces.

In 2011/2012 the funding given was £488 per child, £200 for children of Armed Forces Families. This rose to £600 and £250 respectively in 2012/2013.

From April 2012 the Premium Grant was widened to include those eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (Ever 6 Funding). The funding allocated per child from April 2013 was £900.

In April 2014 the allocation rose to £1300 per child. £1900 is available to support looked after and adopted pupils.

As a school we are aware of all the vulnerable children in our school, and recognise that not all FSM pupils are vulnerable. We also recognise that some children who need additional support do not have Free School Meals.

All Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1 pupils now receive a free school meal. As a school we have asked parents to continue to provide information, confidentially, to ensure that children can still access the support they are entitled to.

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Planned spending and actions for 2015-16 academic year:

- No cost to parents for all school trips for pupils in receipt of PPG
- Year 6 PGL residential subsidised for PPG pupils
- Targeted phonics and reading interventions for low attaining Yr2&3 pupils. Identified during phonics tests and ks1 results.
- To continue to close the gap in attainment for those pupils in receipt of PPG
- Specialist teachers to continue in Martial arts, MFL and Performing Arts
- Outdoor learning opportunities to enrich the curriculum
- Reading Recovery teacher and Number Counts teacher
- All teaching assistants continue to be trained in BRP reading interventions and supporting pupils across the school
- 1-1 phonics intervention
- Alternative provision base to continue for vulnerable pupils with social, emotional and mental health needs ran by L3 teaching assistant and behaviour mentor
- Funded breakfast club for all pupils
- No cost to parents for swimming lessons in year 3 and 4

Behaviour mentor and Pastoral Support Worker employed to provide support for all children and families

Impact fo PPG Spending (End of Key Stage Outcomes only)

Children in receipt of pupil premium data shows:

Children achieving Level 4+

Reading 95% (82% National average)

Writing 95% (76% National average)

Maths 86% (78% National average)

Reading, Writing and Maths combined 86% (67% National average)

Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar 71% (66% National average)

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Children achieving Level 5+

Reading 38% (35% National average)

Writing 19% (20% National average)

Maths 33% (28% National average)

Reading, Writing and Maths combined 10% (12% National average)

Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar 33% (29% National average)

Children in receipt of pupil premium data shows (21/36 children in this cohort):

90% of children made good or better progress in reading

100% of children made good or better progress in writing

95% of children made good or better progress in maths

29% made better than expected progress in reading

48% made better than expected progress in writing

29% made better than expected progress in maths.

Pupil data suggests a further emphasis on supporting children with writing in receipt of pupil premium to make better than expected progress

Children in receipt of pupil premium data shows:

Attendance was 94.01% (PPG 2014-2015).

Those children who attended breakfast and/or 326 clubs, their attendance was above those who did not attend.

Our PASS survey results hope to show an increase in pupil motivation, social skills and emotional well-being.
